Late last summer Cindy travelled to Bush's Crawford, Texas ranch to demand that the President meet with her to explain why we invaded Iraq and thereby why her son was killed. When Bush refused, she set up camp along the road leading to his ranch. Over the next month, thousands of people joined Cindy at "Camp Casey." Her courageous action has inspired millions in the U.S. and around the world.


Cindy Sheehan to Speak on Maui

No Sir!*, an award-winning documentary that tells the little-known story of the rebellion of thousands of US soldiers against the Vietnam War in the 1960's.
